
Entre 1.

This day in particular was fun because of the different activities I was able to participate with the students. There was a lot of activities that occurred such as bowling, tossing the ring, best costume, and many other games. For a second, I went back in time and felt a kid again. I felt part of my childhood and how the holiday use to be.



Entre 3.

- I did a little bit of everything and played different activities with the students. The day overall was calm and mostly interactions.

- Nothing truly made me feel uncomfortable. Everything is calm for most part students do not misbehave. Previously I felt a little uncomfortable when the kids hugged me but I was able to turn hugs into high fives or a handshake.

My response was, wow that is super awesome I like the creativity. I noticed a smile and joy as soon as I told that to the student. I felt good that I asked and I was able to see he felt well that someone asked about his custome. What I learn goes back to the idea that sometimes the kids just want to be asked what something, they want to be known or acknowledged.

• What was most difficult? What can you learn from this?

- As mentioned the most difficult part for me was learning people's names. As I visited the site I was able to learn their names and something new about them every time. For example, every day I had a different question which I would use to start a conversation.

- The person I found a particular interest was Kathy, one of the workers at the teen center. I felt that many times she goes unnoticed but has a big responsibility. I had a conversation about how was it that the teen center started and how has it developed since its origin of time. Mrs Kathy is a great and easy to talk person she also shows and cares for the students as for the place.

- I do not think I have been disappointed at the site, everyday is different and unique.

staff also makes sure to have food for them to eat from. My goal there is talk and hang out with the teens and help around with their homework or make sure that they are engaging with each other and respecting each other.




What does the agency do? How do they do it?
