
Marco Rangel SL 497: Independent Study SL Professor Burke 12/3/2017

- What did you do that made you feel you made a difference? Why?
- One of the biggest things that I felt made a difference for the students and staff was listening to them. I noticed that some of the students did things that they felt positive and happy about but wanted to talk to someone about it. Making the difference for me was as simple as asking how their school day was, what they did they do during the weekend or how did they do on their test. Another action



one can do to make a difference is interacting with the students in the activities they are doing. At moments I did not talk to the students rather I played sports, video games, pool and different activities where a some of the kids felt the most comfortable.

- Throughout my service there was no real moments in which I felt uncomfortable. My experience overall was enjoyable and was a unique opportunity to be there among the students. Perhaps the only moment I was a little uncomfortable was when some of the kids would curse at each other. However with time they eased down and little by little stopped cursing. I am happy to say that they were comfortable enough to talk and when they cursed they would apologize because they would have a Freudian slip were it just came out as a second nature. Towards the end they slowly stopped and and when they did they apologized.

- Throughout my service the first thing I did was try and learn as many of the kids names. I noticed that when I knew the students name they tended to talk more. I tried every time I



spoke with the children to have a positive impact and make the difference when listening and talking to them. Another effective way in which I was able to talk with them was based on the

activities that they were doing. I noticed it was easier to talk about what they were doing. With that been said it was also a little ineffective because there is many students and can be difficult to remember names at first

- At first it was difficult to explain what service learning can be and what you do sometimes. A large aspect of service learning, is learning from the students, kids, staff, anyone where you are located. reasons but once we are exposed to learning is when we see service learning is truly about. Needless to mention if we are not exposed to different scenarios we would not think of the different things that happen.

- There are many different things that impacted me in a positive manner. However, what impacted me the most was creating a friendship and them to look up at me. I have had the honor and privilege to encounter students outside of service learning and they look at me as someone they know. - There were a couple of difficulties toward the end. One of them was learning the students



names at the beginning. With time and interacting with them I slowly learned who they were and their names. During the first times it was difficult to talk to them because they did not really know who I was. Which led to them sometimes not really care and curse out loud. I began to tell them and was able to make them understand that they should not curse around me. Another moment was

when the students sometimes hugged me, however I was able show them that they could give me a high-five instead. Without making them feel as I was pushing them away or creating a boundary where they did not want to talk to me anymore.

- I learned that all the student are interesting and particular in their own ways. I was able to talk to many of the students and learn about. The students are all very different and particular with the different type of ideas they think of. Each student was unique and had their own unique personality and characteristics.
